This course carrying 100 marks will have to be designed and evaluated according to local conditions by the Colleges in consultation with the Universities and State Bar Councils. It can be taught partly through classroom instructions including simulation exercises and partly through extension programmes like Lok Adalat, Legal Aid Camp, Legal Literacy and Para Legal Training. The course should also contain lessons on Negotiations and Counselling, use of computer in legal work, legal research in support of Public Interest Litigation, writing of case comments, editing of Law Journals and Law office. management. The marks may be appropriately divided to the different programmes that each University might evolve for introduction in the colleges under its control.

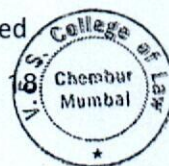

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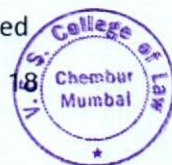

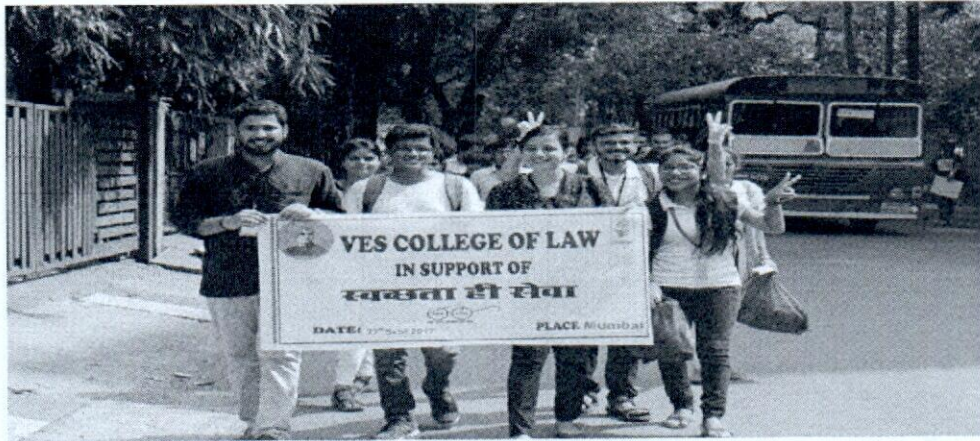


## Activity Report 2017-18

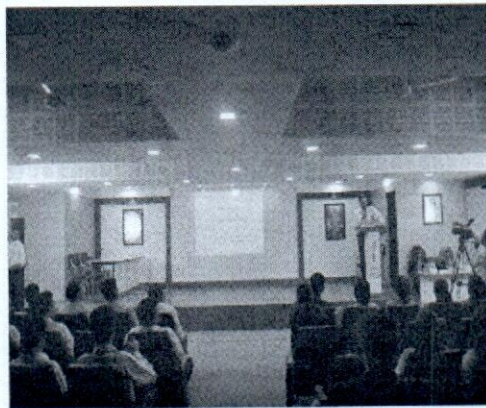
Various topics related to the Sustainable Development Goals were assigned to the participants to bring about awareness about the SDGs.

Academicians and students presented various research papers pertaining to the theme and subthemes of the Seminar highlighting the plight of children in India and solutions to bring about a change.

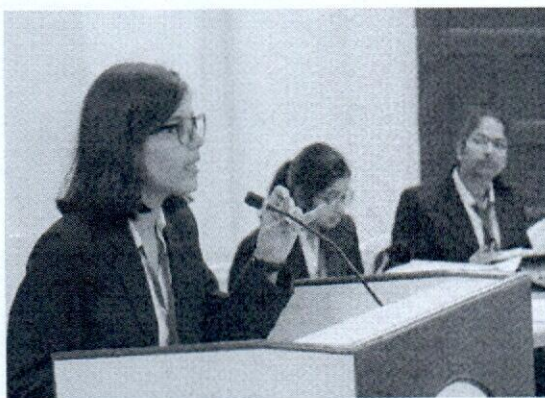


### **EXPERT TALK**

### **Late Shri. Hashuji Advani Memorial National Moot Court Competition.**

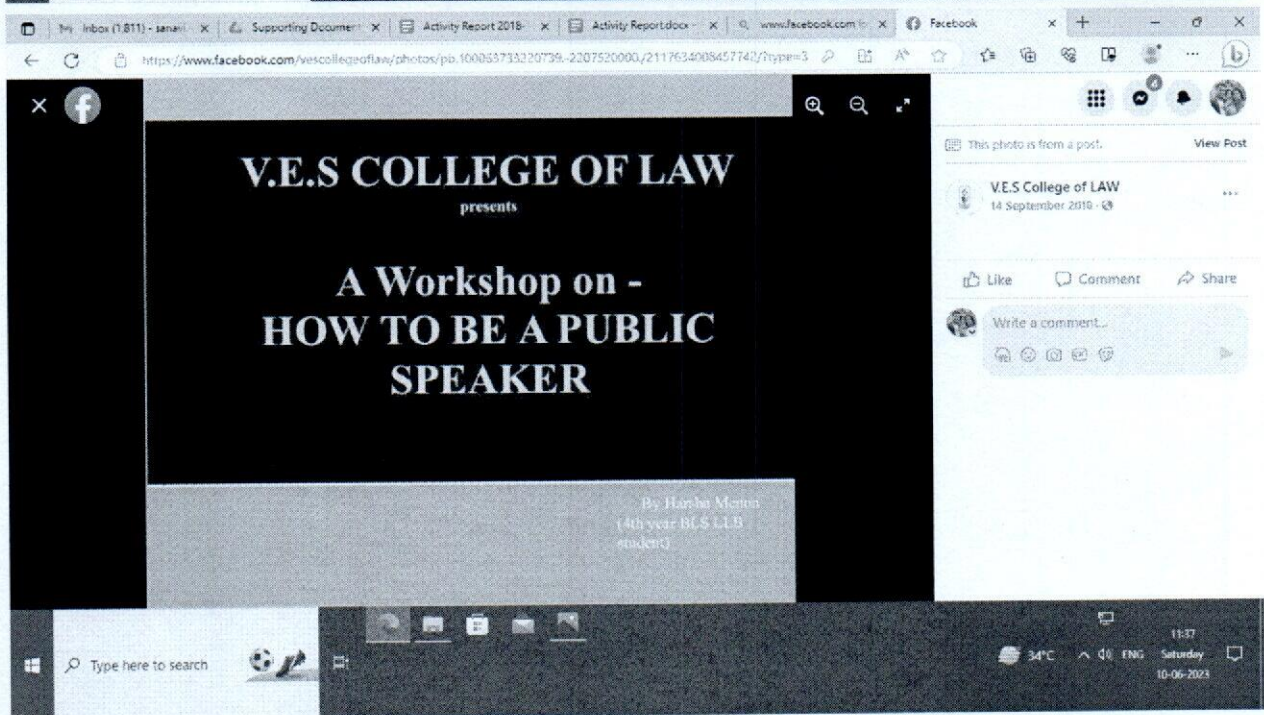
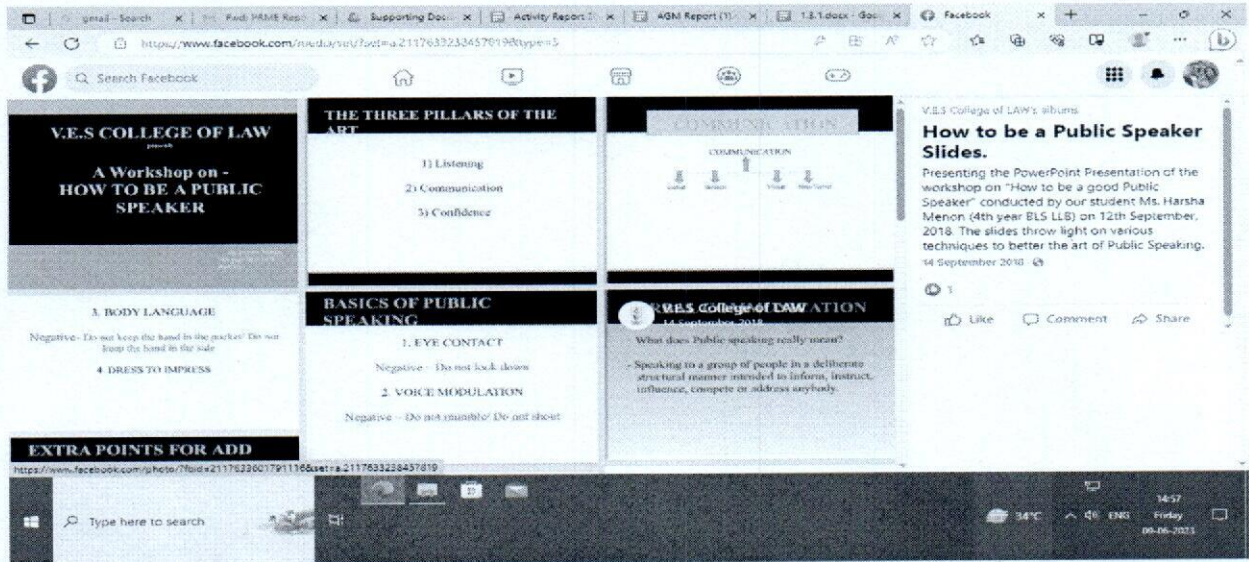

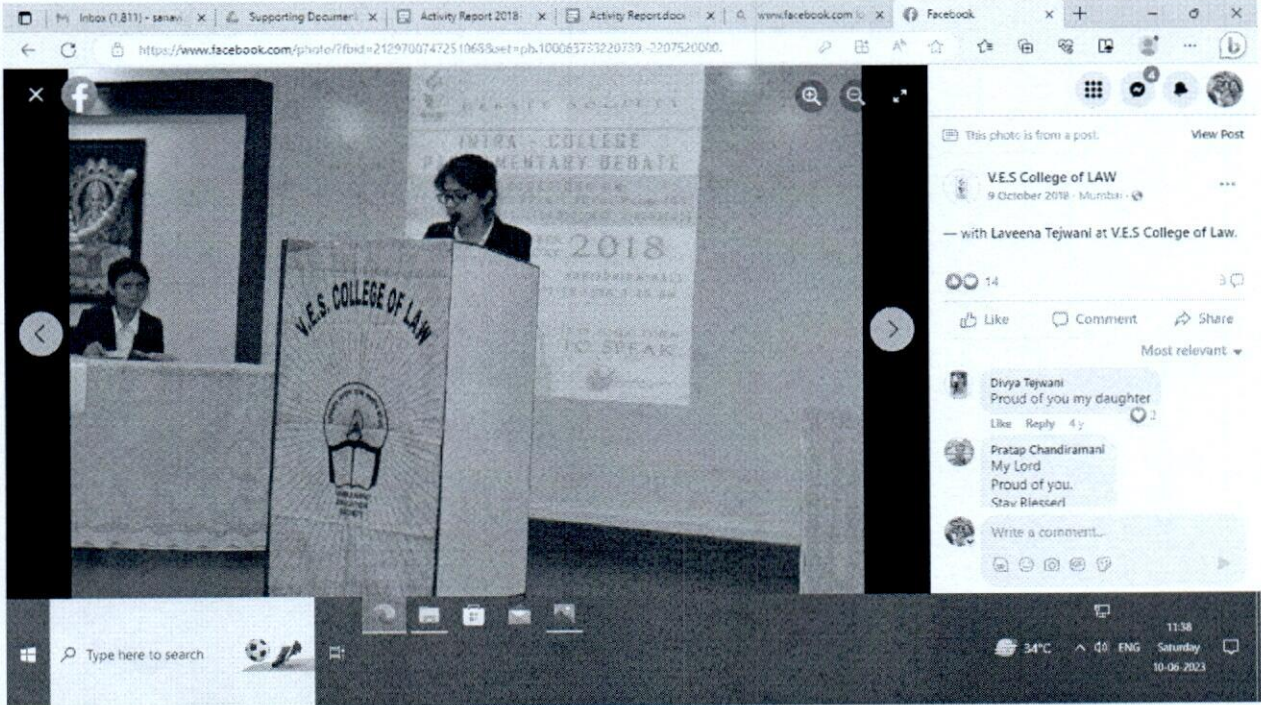


needs to be developed to present the arguments well. Prof. Sheetakumar Setia and Adv. Priyanka Dias were invited as expert speakers for the session.

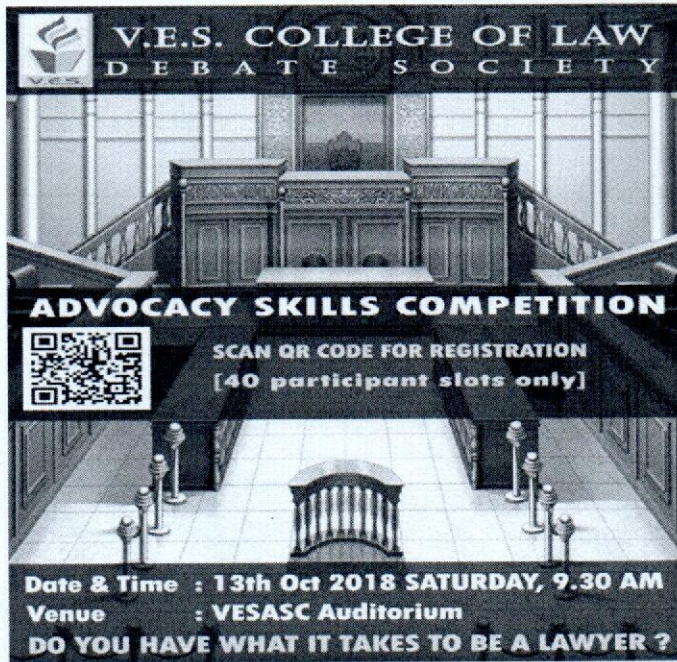


**6. ADVOCACY SKILLS COMPETITION (13TH OCTOBER):**

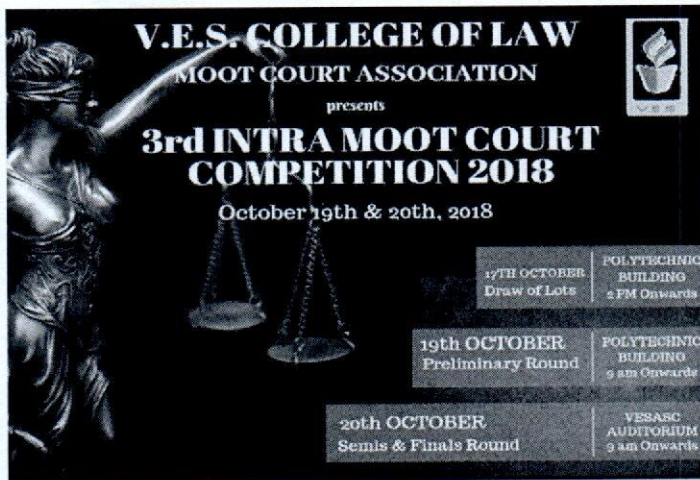






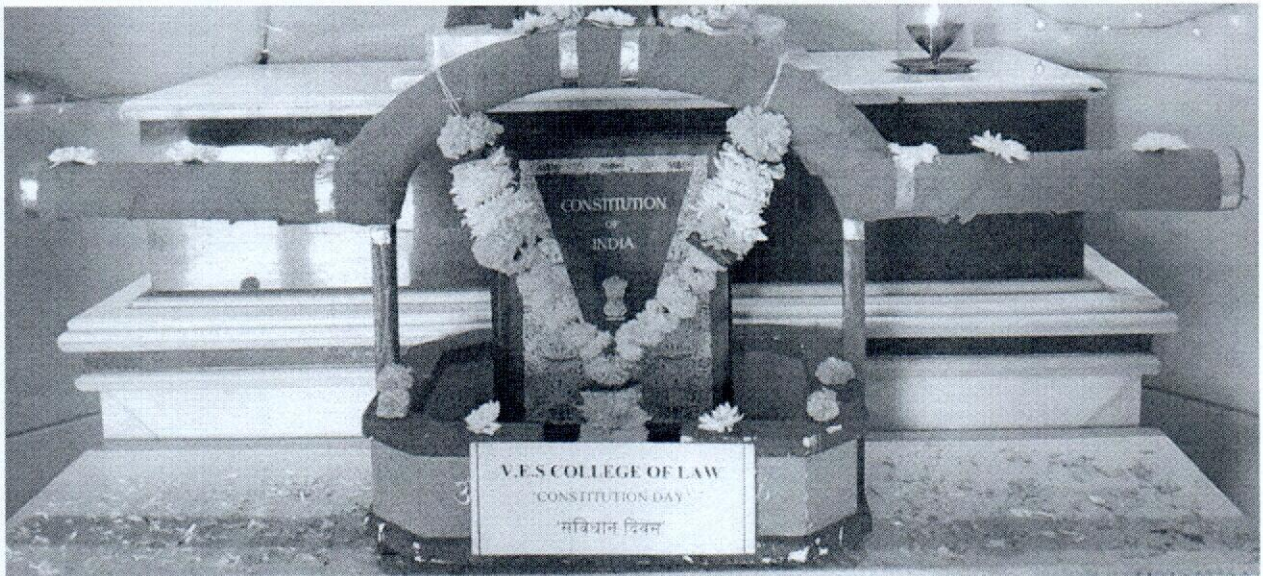
**7. INTRA-MOOT COURT COMPETITION (19TH & 20TH OCTOBER)**

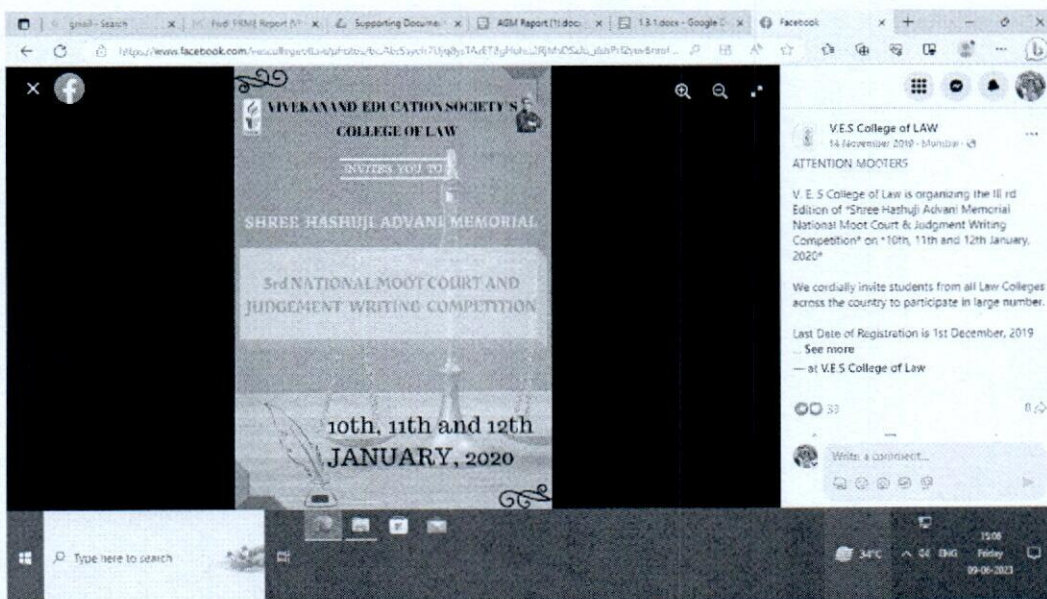



**2ND SHREE HASHUJI ADVANI MEMORIAL NATIONAL LEVEL MOOT COURT COMPETITION 2018-19**

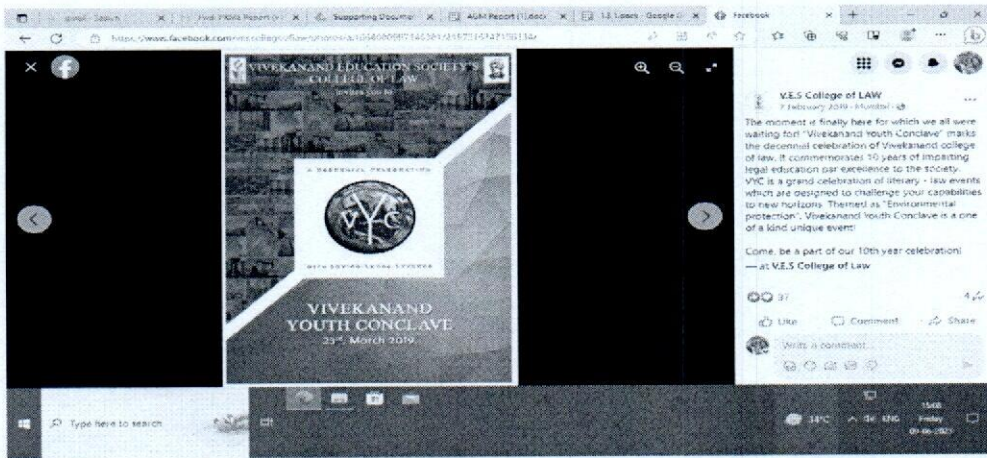

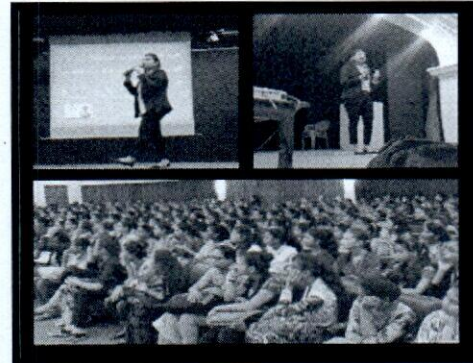

Hence, the event was a power packed session and a new beginning with students working towards gender equality, quality education and other SDGs.



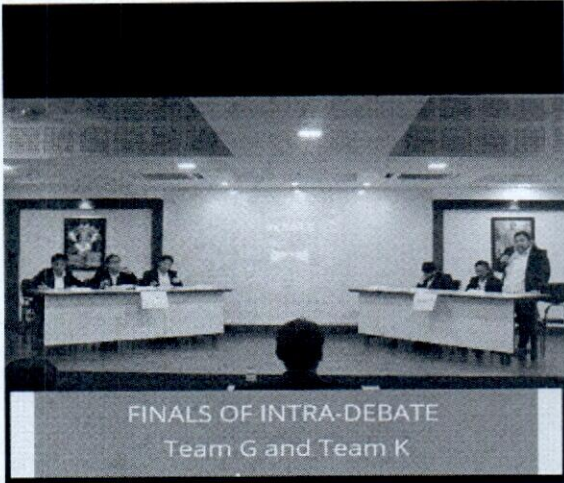
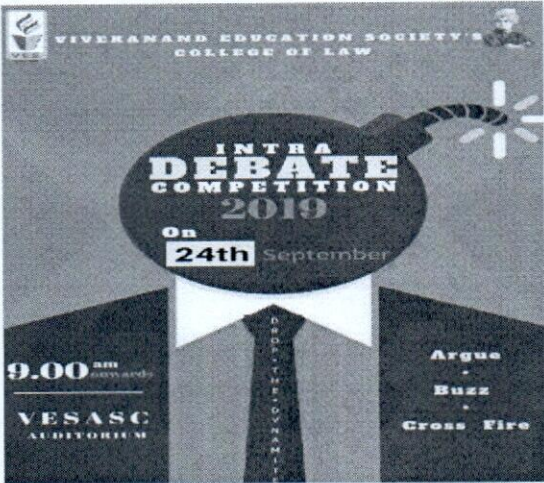
<p>24<sup>th</sup> SEPTMBE R 2019</p>	<p>INTRA-DEBATE COMPETITION</p>

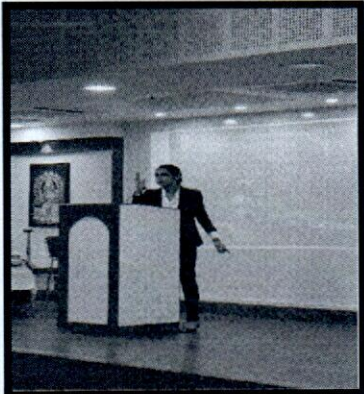

This not only helped in creating awareness in the society but also engraved the constitutional principles in the minds of the students in a practical manner.

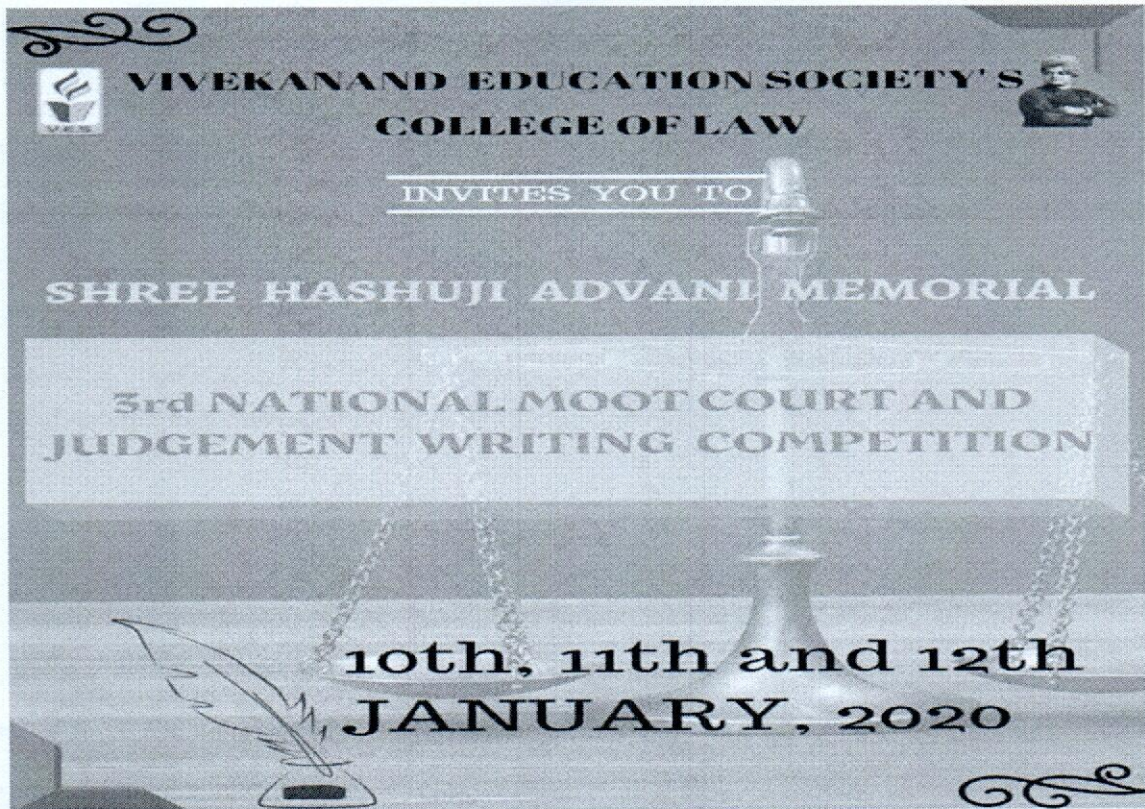

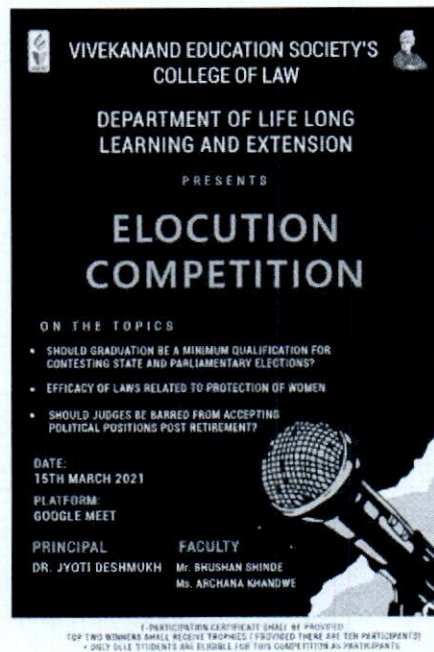
The Eminent Speakers for the Webinar were as follows:

only encouraging public speaking of the students but also to create awareness on certain important Legal topics.


The Topics for the debate were as follows:

The Department of Life Long Learning and Extension ( DLLE) of VES College of Law had organized a Webinar on “ Role of Police in Criminal Justice Administration”.

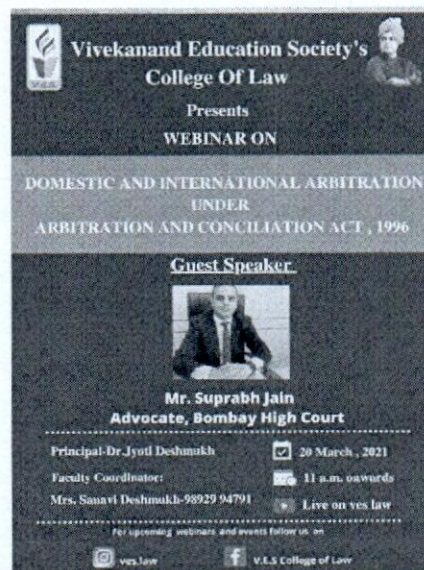
The main objective of the webinar was to enlighten aspiring law officers about the Role of Police in Criminal Justice Administration and how the law is implemented by the Police System.
